What does it look like to be stuck in collapse? The selection for the citizenM's elevator presents visions of failing, burning, melting, and drowning, where a perceived condition of individual crisis intertwines with the one of a peculiar community, that of Rome.

Glimpses of modern and ancient ruins portray a city where stuckness reverberates as a prominent feeling, triggering either despair or detachment. Here, new epics seem to become possible: tragedy merges with comedy in the foreground of a collapsing scenario, where signs from different temporalities encounter.

For STUCK!, Gaia Bobò and Auriea Harvey sent out an open call, and over 80 films were submitted.

The installations will remain in place for three years. Thousands of citizenM guests will come face-to-face with the works. The selected artists will receive an artist fee of €1250,- and a free night at the hotel, which opens on January 25, 2024.

citizenM has already selected works for hotels in Austin, London, Miami, Paris, Seattle, and Washington and is now focusing on the selection for their new Boston Back Bay hotel.



## The One Minutes

STUCK! by Gaia Bobò and Auriea Harvey

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Sonia Andresano's work depicts a scene of lyric frenzy taking place in one – of the many – contemporary ruins of Rome. In such a disheartening scenography, a sentiment is cultivated. A stubborn force seems to animate the gymnast in her endless attempt to keep a handstand, finding a new balance in disequilibrium.

Beatrice Favaretto stages a likely scene of the suburbs of a metropolis, turning it into an uncanny Romantic landscape. The uneasy vision of a burning car slowly fades away, giving way to the swirling beauty of the smoke spreading from the putting out of the fire.

The ancient ruins by Edoardo Aruta, slowly melting into a chocolate fondue, stay as a caustic *memento mori* of a city that struggles with dealing with its cumbersome past throughout the centuries, from the Grand Tour to the Eat ad Go Tourism, suggesting it will probably die trying.

Lastly, Giulia Crivellaro's drowning process in a quicksand pod troubles a voyeuristic attitude to suffering. The tragic masque of the video is rouged with an Instagram filter, generating a grotesque effect where the viewer is involved in first person, subverting the hierarchy between the hunter and the prey.
